Judy attended Pratt Institute where she took a degree in package design. After moving to Virginia she took a degree in Art Education from Old Dominion University and later a Master's Degree. She taught Advertising Design at the Virginia Beach Career Development Center and her students were sought after by multiple advertising agencies. Retiring from teaching in 2001, she continued her passion of creating glass sculptures and winning numerous awards, including several Awards of Excellence and Awards of Merit at the Guild's Annual Members Shows.



Emilio Santini is teaching torch working classes at Cristallo Art Center!

"Venetian Flameworking With Soft Glass"

The class will focus on the Venetian techniques of working with soft glass without the use of mandrel and with mandrel for bead making. Proper control of reheating and control of the flame will be covered at length. Demonstration of various techniques will be covered in the making of human figures, various animals, and basic insects. The focus of the workshop is to teach flameworking for a more sculptural approach to glass working small to develop individual techniques. Class is open to All Levels.

"Venetian Flameworking With Soft Glass &Borosilicate Glass"

The class will focus on sculptural and figurative forms such as human figures, animals and insects. Emilio will introduce the techniques step by step on how to make human forms in boro or soft glass. He will also demonstrate how to blow each of the types of glass using mini blowpipes at the torch. Students will be assisted to develop and create individual ideas using traditional Venetian techniques while learning how to create miniature figurative or sculptural forms, bottles and vessels 2" to 3" in size. New Members

Margot Thigpen

I first started engraving in the early nineties. I had always loved drawing from an early age and had worked in stained glass so it was an easy transition into carving. I believe that fate led me to glass engraving as I wanted to attend an Ausglass workshop and the only vacancy was with Anne Dybka, Master Glass Engraver/ Artist. It was a three day workshop and the beginning of a wonderful mentor-ship that lasted until Anne passed away 8 years ago. To this day, my first engraving is one that I keep with pride as it is a joint piece.

I have always worked alone in my own studio. Engraving is very solitary, especially in the USA. To me, it is a deep meditation. I work in intaglio, relief, occasionally stipple engraving, scratching and carving. My preference is generally towards deep carving but now I'm venturing into cameo. This is very labour intensive and uses a dentists drill or Micro Motor. I see my engraving as a full time job. I work 6 hours a day in the studio, 5 days a week and supplement my income with a B & B.

I know that some people struggle with the creative inspiration but I don't. I tend to break up my work into "bread and butter" and exhibition work. More and more it's becoming exhibition work as I get older.

Exhibition and commission work is scarce in the USA. Glass engraving is really no longer a preferred art form here, and as far as I can find there are less than half a dozen engravers. I enter competitions, local galleries and submit to juried shows, accept all commission work and tour the country looking for an appropriate gallery to show my work.



Robin Short

My husband (Dan) and I moved to the Chesapeake area 4 years ago. My two boys, Daron (27), and Kevin (25) still live in our home state Louisiana. I found myself in need of a hobby. In January I took a glass seminar at the Chrysler Art Center and found a medium I was interested in pursuing. In March I attended a class with Ali Rogan and instantly became obsessed with glass fusing. Studying under Ali has helped me grow extremely as an artist. Even though I'm still trying to find my expression within the glass, I have created a few pieces I'm proud to put my name on. I'm looking forward to participating in several art shows and maybe opening my own glass studio in the future.

Michael Rogers is offering a new type of design workshop to assist artists in finding their "voice" using a variety of materials and techniques that will enable an artist to transform objects from the ordinary, into the extraordinary. A rebus is an allusional device that uses pictures to represent words or parts of words, like pictograms. Students will use associative thinking, metaphors, poetry, lyricism, and narrative to assist in developing personal content for creative ideas. Learn how to discover ways of working and designing artwork that is significant to you and explore how objects are connected or joined together through a variety of glass or mixed media fabrication processes. The basic idea is to create a story using found objects to invent a sculptural rebus. Students will be sent further information for this class and recommended preparation prior to class instruction.

Michael Rogers is currently a Professor at Rochester Institute of Technology's School For American Crafts in New York where he has taught for the past nine years in the Glass Program. Previously he spent 11 years in Japan where he was head of Aichi University's Glass Program. His work is in several international permanent collections, including the Suntory Museum in Japan and the Corning Museum of Glass in the United States. Recent exhibitions include "Art on The Edge" at the New Mexico Museum of Art, Art Santa Fe with Bullseye Gallery, "Messages and Written Narratives" at the Chautauqua Institute, NY, "Palimpsests and Ephemera" at the Society of Arts and Crafts, Boston, MA, and "Voice of Glass" at the Academy of Art in Riga, Latvia. This past year Michael has lectured at North Lands in Scotland, the New University of Lisbon in Portugal, Aalto University of Art and Design in Helsinki, Finland and Toyama Institute of Glass Art in Japan. The 2014 PGG Educational Scholarship Application

The Peninsula Glass Guild is offering \$2,000 in scholarships for 2015

The award money is payable directly to the school of the recipient's choice towards tuition, room and board for a glass art class. Members are eligible for the scholarship if they have paid their dues and been a member of the Guild for at least one year by the application deadline. Applicants will need at least 10 images of their work and will be required to prepare a one page essay indicating why they need the scholarship and what they intend to do with it. Our judge for the scholarship applications will be Michael Rogers, who is also the juror for our 27th Annual Juried Exhibition.

This application, the one page essay, and 10 images of your work should be packaged together and must be received no later than the close of the December 7 Peninsula Glass Guild meeting at The Charles H. Taylor Arts Center. Winners will be announced during the opening reception awards ceremony on December 14. Winners are responsible for applying to the school of their choice and delivering the invoice to the PGG Treasurer so payment can be made. Scholarship funds will be available to winners in 2015. If not used by the end of 2015, the scholarship will be revoked

Winners are also required to make a presentation to the membership sharing knowledge or information on techniques gained from the class. The winner is expected to enter a piece of their artwork for auction in the 2015 Silent Auction, the Guild's primary fundraiser for scholarships.
