### Past Events

**2014-2015 Guild Donation** In conjunction with a hot casting workshop held at Chrysler Museum Glass Studio in May 2014, the guild purchased and donated to the studio 800 pounds of Green Diamond Domestic Olivine sand. This gift to a public educational facility meets the guild's requirement for the annual donation. Though workshop attendees struggled with some technical difficulties, it is hoped that going forward, this olivine will successfully be used by the studio to produce castings with smooth surfaces and fine detail. Members should know that this product is available to be used should they wish to rent hot casting time at the Glass Studio. This is also the product that will be used in the kiln casting demonstration to be held in November at Visual Arts Center of Richmond.

**2015 Williamsburg Fall Arts** Eighteen members of Virginia Glass Guild participated either by creating a unique piece of glass art for the Photos, Glass & Floral Exhibit, selling their artwork, or providing valuable support for both events. The two events were held September 18-19 at the Launchpad 757 and Liz Moore &

Associates, both in Williamsburg's New Town.

During the Launchpad757 opening reception, over 300 invited guests viewed artwork created by ten guild artists, each piece inspired by a photograph of James City County. Williamsburg Garden Club members created floral arrangements inspired by the by the same photographs.

**The Chrysler Museum of Art Collection Tour** Diane C. Wright, the curator of glass at The Chrysler Museum of Art and the juror for our annual exhibition this year will give VGG members a private tour of the museum's collection. This tour will be scheduled for sometime after the exhibit closes and details will be published in the winter edition of the newsletter. This is an amazing opportunity to be exposed to the collection with commentary from an expert in the field and the guild is grateful for the invitation.

**Virginia Historic Garden Week, Williamsburg Virginia** The guild has been invited to participate in the Williamsburg Historic Garden Week tour to be held on Tuesday April 26, 2016. A beautiful venue in Swem Library on the College of William & Mary campus will be filled with Virginia Glass Guild artist's glass art for sale. The glass art for sale will follow along a theme, given that it will be held during Historic Garden Week and the primary attendees will be women interested in gardening. Items should be limited to garden art, jewelry, vases, glass flowers, serving utensils and serving items with floral themes. A package service will be provided for customers who do not wish to carry their purchases with them as they tour. Advertising for VGG participation in this event will be distributed in approximately 90,000 booklets statewide. Start planning now for this sale!

**Glass Doors Gallery, Cultural Arts Center of Glen Allen, Virginia** The guild received an invitation to exhibit next year in the Glass Doors Gallery. The exhibition area consists of 3 glass enclosed cases each 5 ft. W x 7ft H x 2 ft. D. Each case houses 2 or 3 glass shelves the width of the case. The dates of the exhibit are July 21-September 18, 2016. Images of artwork to be entered will be needed for published advertising in February 2016, so start planning now!

#### **GUILD FINANCES IN NEED OF HELP**

The combination of membership dues, annual show fees, silent auction, and percentage of member sales at sponsored events is not enough to sustain our VGG program of scholarships, awards and exhibition expenses at the current level. The major difficulty is that grant money is now more competitive than it was five years ago. So, in order to sustain growth for the Guild, we have to look at ways of raising funds and donations. VGG must regroup and cultivate sponsors as well as participate in more fund raising venues. To that end, the Guild will participate in the **givelocal757** nonprofit fund raiser next May!

#### givelocal757

The Guild is participating in the 2016 **givelocal757** fundraiser for non-profits sponsored by the Community Foundations in the 757 area code. This will be the single best opportunity for the Guild to raise the funds we need to continue our growth and sustain our scholarship program. The online fund raising event will be held on May 3rd, 2016, midnight to midnight. During the 24 hour period **givelocal757** will operate a website that lists all participating non-profits. Each participant will have a unique URL so that all donations go directly to that non-profit. In other words, each and every donation made to the Guild will belong to the Guild. Donations will be made by credit card with a minimum of \$10.00.

Between now and May, **givelocal757** will publicize the event but it is up to the Guild to make the case for our donations. We need volunteers to be on our **givelocal757** team and we also need all members to become familiar with the **givelocal757.org** basics found on the website. Gallery Manager, James Warwick Jones notes, "More than any other group of artists I know, these VGG members are constantly taking workshops, studying their craft and learning new techniques, which they incorporate into their latest work as it evolves and expands."



The Chrysler Museum of Art hired Diane C. Wright as the Carolyn and Richard Barry Curator of Glass. Wright began her new appointment in March 2014. She is responsible for the display, interpretation, study, and care of works of art in the Museum's glass collection of more than 10,000 objects. Wright comes to the Chrysler Museum from the Pilchuck Glass School in Stanwood, Wash., where she was the marketing and communications manager. She received a master's degree in the history of decorative arts and design from Parsons The New School for Design, specializing in glass studies. She has conducted research and lectured on glass for a number of institutions and has served as the Marcia Brady Tucker Senior Curatorial Fellow in the American Decorative Arts Department at the Yale University Art Gallery.

Wright has extensively researched the leaded-glass windows and mosaics of Tiffany Studios. She co-curated the exhibition "Louis C. Tiffany and the Art of Devotion" at the Museum of Biblical Art in New York and recently co-curated "Wheaton Glass: the Art of the Fellowship" at the WheatonArts American Museum of Glass in Millville, N.J.

Wright taught courses on the history of glass at the Rhode Island School of Design, Parsons The New School for Design, and George Mason University and has written on glass for Modern Magazine, Glass Quarterly, the Journal of Glass Studies, and the Yale University Art Gallery Bulletin. ### 2015 Educational Scholarship Application

Virginia Glass Guild is offering \$2000 in educational scholarships this year. The award money will be payable directly to the school of the recipient's choice towards tuition, room and board for a glass art class. Members are eligible to apply for a scholarship if they have paid their dues for membership year 2015-2016 and been a member of the Guild for at least one year by the application deadline. Applicants will provide at least 10 images of their work and will be required to prepare a one page essay indicating why they need the scholarship and specifically what they intend to study. Diane Wright, who is the juror for our 28th Annual Juried Exhibition, will review the applications and award the scholarships.

This application, the one page essay, and 10 images of your work should be packaged together and must be received no later than the close of the Sunday December 6 Virginia Glass Guild meeting at The Charles H. Taylor Arts Center. Winners will be announced during the opening reception awards ceremony on Sunday December 13. Winners are responsible for applying to the school of their choice and delivering the invoice to the VGG Treasurer so payment can be made. Scholarship funds will be available to recipients for the entire 2016 calendar year. If award money has not been distributed by the end of 2016, the recipient will forfeit the scholarship.

Winners are also required to make a presentation to the membership sharing knowledge or information on techniques gained from the class. The winner is expected to enter a piece of their artwork for auction in the 2016 Silent Auction, the Guild's primary fundraiser for scholarships.

### 2015 Silent Auction

The annual Silent Auction is the Guild's most important fundraiser with proceeds going to support our Educational Scholarship Program. The Guild has increased the scholarship amount to \$2000 over the past two years, but the Silent Auction proceeds have not quite kept pace with these increases. Last year four guild members received scholarship awards in the amount of \$500 and will soon be making a presentation to the guild to share what they have learned. Each scholarship recipient is expected to donate one piece to this year's auction in appreciation for the support they received. A similar commitment by each guild member would insure a fantastic auction and very good chance at meeting our goal of \$2000 in proceeds.

Please support the Silent Auction with your pieces, large and small, and encourage friends and family to come and bid on some beautiful local glasswork! Committee members are needed for organizing the Silent Auction. Board Member and Treasurer Dan Smith is chairman of the Fundraising Committee. Please consider supporting the guild with a few volunteer hours to make this our most successful Silent Auction to date.

Contributing artists will be able to set a minimum bid for their donated artwork and the proceeds from successfully auctioned pieces will be split 40% artist, 40% guild and 20% CHTAC. The Fundraising Committee will soon be discussing any changes to be made in this year's format and all members will be made aware before the drop off dates. One suggestion made last year is to establish a *Buy It Now* price for each piece, giving bidders the opportunity to secure their favorite piece at a higher price, but still below the established value for the work. Auction pieces can be delivered to the Charles H Taylor Arts Center during the artwork drop off dates for the 28<sup>th</sup> Annual Glass Juried Exhibition, December 3-6.

#### **REFLECTIONS FROM THE EDGE: GLASS, ART, AND PERFORMANCE**

October 8, 2015 — The Glass Art Society (GAS) invites artists to submit proposals for its  $46^{th}$  annual conference, to be held June 1-3, 2017 in Norfolk, Va. The conference is hosted by the Chrysler Museum of Art and its Perry Glass Studio.

The 2017 conference theme will be *Reflections from the Edge: Glass, Art, and Performance.* Artists are invited to <u>submit proposals</u> now through December 15, 2015 for content highlighting the theme, to include performances, technical demonstrations, lectures, panel discussions, and film screenings. We encourage artists and critics to strongly consider the history of glass as a performance medium and how this past is influencing the field's current and future climate with the larger contemporary art world.

GAS selected the Chrysler, in part, on the strengths of its renowned glass collection and its state-of-the-art Perry Glass Studio's growing national reputation in the world of glass, especially its groundbreaking glass theatrical performances.

Coastal Virginia is home to a thriving arts community that includes the Virginia Museum of Contemporary Art and the **Virginia Glass Guild**, and is the site of Jamestown, where the first glassmaking in Colonial America took place in 1608. Both the Museum and the Glass Studio serve as an anchor for Norfolk's blossoming NEON, or New Energy of Norfolk, arts district. The district will launch in fall 2015, inviting visual, performing, culinary, and touring artists to transform several downtown blocks into a synergistic urban hub for creativity.

The 2017 GAS conference is co-chaired by Diane Wright, the Chrysler's Carolyn and Richard Barry Curator of Glass; Charlotte Potter, Glass Studio Manager and Programming Director; and community volunteers Virginia Hitch and Colin McKinnon.

"We are eager to welcome so many artists working in the field of glass to Norfolk, a community with a tremendous passion for supporting the arts, especially glass," Wright said. "For this conference we invite the international glass community to explore the deep history that glass has to offer, as well as to highlight some of the future movements in the field. We look forward to rolling out the red carpet in June 2017!"

The state-of-the-art Perry Glass Studio, launched in 2011 to complement the Museum's glass collection, helps demonstrate how masterworks in the collection were created. The Studio offers free public glassmaking demonstrations and classes and workshops for all levels of expertise. Its educational assistantship program helps train the next generation of glass professionals. Over the past four years, its Visiting Artist Series has brought many of the world's great names to Norfolk to create new works of art as the public watches. In addition, the Studio's monthly evening performances on Third Thursday have helped establish a reputation for its innovation and groundbreaking glass theater. The venue is a full-service glass studio with a 560-pound capacity furnace, a full hot shop, a flameworking studio, nine annealing ovens, a flat-glass shop, and a coldworking shop.

The Chrysler Museum of Art maintains an encyclopedic collection of more than 10,000 works in glass, including significant strengths in American, English and French glass. The Museum's extensive Tiffany collection is world-famous, containing many blown-glass masterworks, as well as opulent windows, lamps, and decorative arts. The contemporary glass collection is far-reaching with representations of the Studio Glass Movement and works that illustrate new, innovative practices in contemporary glass. Recent acquisitions within the galleries include historic glass by Frederick Carder and Christopher Dresser and contemporary works by renowned artists such as Beth Lipman, Luke Jerram, Etsuko Ichikawa, Steffen Dam, Jun Kaneko, and Stanislav Libenský and JaroslavaBrychtová.
