From the President's Desk

Virginia Glass Guild can take great pride in accomplishing another beautiful and successful Annual Juried Exhibition. The membership was well represented, with a total of 40 member artists contributing artwork. The gallery reports that the exhibit attracted 1358 visitors, and total sales were \$2720. Photo spreads appeared in Daily Press on January 10 and VEER Magazine, The Scene.

Significant changes are planned for the 2016 juried exhibition, which require your attention so you will be prepared. The opening date for the exhibit will be October 15, with the reception to be held on October 16, and the exhibit will run until the first weekend in December. In addition, artists will be required to submit digital images for a pre-jury process, which will define the artwork to be delivered for exhibit. The same juror will then determine the awards based on visual inspection of the artwork in the gallery. The pre-jury process will necessitate that artists deliver images of their artwork approximately eight weeks prior to the drop off date for the exhibit. Therefore, members should plan to have their artwork completed and photographed by mid-August. To facilitate this process, the guild is planning a Photography Workshop in late July for members who would like to take advantage of this very reasonably priced service.

The shift in juried exhibition dates makes it necessary to change the publication date for the next Newsletter. Therefore, the Newsletter will be published twice yearly, early in the months of February and August.

The Publicity Committee has been working hard on a new website, Facebook page, brochure, rack card and member badge for the guild. You will find links for the website and Facebook page at the end of the newsletter, please be sure to visit!

The board has crafted a statement to reflect the mission of Virginia Glass Guild.

Through the Looking Glass

Artist's Statement: The work explores the space between my self and the other, both tangibly and metaphysically. In my current studio practice I struggle with duality, so it is only fitting that glass, a prominent material within my work, has binary qualities cloaked with competing characteristics: liquid and solid, elastic and brittle, captivating and humbling. I am constantly looking for historical references, relevance, and reasoning for using this material.

My works begin with historical model, paying homage to traditional glass techniques, or industries that have used glass, which I refashion to create commentary on our present moment in time. The human desire and dilemma to bridge the unfathomable distance between each other is at the heart of my investigation.



Charlotte Potter, originally from Vermont, is an artist and designer who uses glass and new media. She received her B.F.A. from Alfred University and an M.F.A. from the Rhode Island School of Design, where she was an instructor. A pioneer in developing glass as a performance medium, her work has been exhibited in museums and galleries internationally. She is the *Chrysler Museum Glass Studio* Manager and Programming Director.

This fall I took part in the Studio Assistant Program at the Chrysler Museum of Art Glass Studio. As part of the assistantship program I exhibited my work, *Three Madonnas*, in Vestibule 102 at the glass studio from December 27, 2015 to January 3, 2016.

work is the wood plinth, antique rug, Luminara candles and hot glass sculpted roses at the foot of the glass panels.

Ali Rogan, Vice President of VGG, glass art teacher and owner of Cristallo Art Center, was my mentor and advisor and provided the space in her studio to complete the project. My techniques included reverse glass painting, casting and kiln formed glass, engraving, and photo techniques.

Three Madonnas was inspired by a medieval triptych in the Chrysler Museum's collection, *Madonna and Child Flanked by Four Saints*. My work is a contemporary take on a traditional religious object. Often when artists were commissioned to do religious art, they used their patrons as subjects. This was done at their patron's request because they paid for the art and wanted to be included in the final work. The three madonnas are myself, my daughter and my granddaughter. In this respect I was carrying on this age-old tradition. An integral part of my

At the invitation of Garden Club of Virginia organizers of Historic Garden Week in Williamsburg, guild members will exhibit and sell glass art inspired by nature with colors and textures found in the garden. Guild artists are invited to exhibit decorative as well as functional glass art to enhance the home and garden; including unique vessels, jewelry, sculptures, serving pieces, and garden art. The audience for this sale will be the attendees of the garden tour, which is a popular ticketed event advertised throughout Virginia.

The artwork will be set up early on the day of the sale and removed immediately following the event. All sales will be handled through the guild treasury with a 20% commission charged, and proceeds used to fund Educational Scholarships for 2016. A package station will be provided for purchases to be picked up later in the day. Each exhibiting member will be required to volunteer several hours for the event. A vendor ticket will be given to each participant to enjoy the garden tour with the rest of your day. The Glass Doors Gallery is located in the main lobby of the Center in front of the Grand Ballroom. As its name suggests, the exhibition area consists of 3 glass enclosed display cases each 5 ft. W x 7ft H x 2 ft. D. Each case houses 2-3 glass shelves the width of the case. Guild members are invited to place artwork for sale in this exhibit, with dimensions capable of fitting in these cases. All artwork, sold or unsold, must remain on display for the entire duration of the exhibit. Artists are responsible for drop off and pick up of their artwork, but no additional volunteer hours are required. All sales are handled through the Center's gift shop and the guild treasury with a total commission of 40% charged. The Center will provide insurance covering loss, theft or damage due to malicious intent for work within the gallery for 65% of stated retail value of work.

Public Donation of Glass Art

Virginia Glass Guild is planning a hands-on event for children in the art classroom at the Children's Museum. The glass art experience will involve each child creating a painting on paper with an image answering this one question: "What did you like the most about this Museum?". Each child will then have the opportunity to make a small fused glass tile of their own design. This will enable them to learn the language of glass fusing and watch a demonstration of how it fuses in a small tester kiln. Our VGG members will be demonstrating how the childrens' paintings will be translated into larger fused glass tiles that will later be kiln fired. The children can observe and if desired, assist our members if time permits after finishing their class project. These glass tiles will be white or black glass as the top sheet and clear glass on the bottom, with glass frits, powders, stringers, confetti and some small fusing glass pieces used to duplicate the childrens' paintings. Completed glass tiles will later be assembled to create an artwork installation

within the Children's Museum. A grand unveiling event will reveal a tiled wall with glass artwork inspired by the children. The guild will set up an information table at this event, documenting how the project was completed, from start to finish. Our goal will be to interact with a least 50-100 children and their parents as we introduce them to glass as an art form.

More details will be made available following a planning meeting with the Children's Museum of Virginia. The workshop will be planned for late spring or early summer.

Spurchise currently works as an instructional assistant for the glass department at Tidewater Community College in Portsmouth, Virginia, and as a staff instructor at the Chrysler Museum of Art Glass Studio.

Educational Scholarship Presentations

Jude Schlotzhauer



I used my scholarship to attend two workshops. The first was a weekend lecture/ demo on casting techniques given by Daniel Clayman at the Corning School. Dan is a master mold maker and excellent teacher. He packed a lot of information, both verbal and visual, into two days. He thoroughly covered mold mix recipes and techniques, particularly for large scale work, as well as rubber molds, multipart molds, problem solving and sources for materials. Although I doubt I will ever use his complex methods for arriving at the forms he uses, it was very interesting seeing how he works out a design, often mathematically, in wood or styrofoam before making it in glass.

In August I used the rest of my scholarship to take a week long workshop in press molds with Jennifer Halvorson at the Pittsburgh Glass Center. The techniques explored in this workshop were totally applicable to the kind of cast work that I do. It was all small scale using both found objects and waxes to cast from. I became much more adept at making two part molds, which allows for casting small delicate two sided objects. The process is time consuming because after making the first investment, keys are cut into the plaster, the mold needs to be coated with Vaseline, a collar placed around it again so that the second half of the mold can be poured. After that the two halves are separated, cleaned and filled with glass frit, and the top half of the mold is placed on. The molds are fired slowly with bricks weighting the tops so the glass is pressed as it fires. A lot of delicate cold working is needed as the last part of the process, as the glass is squeezed out

around the form. The workshop was thoroughly enjoyable, especially the relaxing aspect of being a student instead of a teacher, with no responsibility other than for my own work. I have been working on some new pieces in my studio using these press mold techniques. I would recommend Jennifer as a well informed, thorough teacher. Of the pieces displayed in the recent Guild show, I used key plates found at a salvage place in Pittsburgh to make the "passages" for each of the three artworks.

Educational Scholarships are funded each year through the Annual Silent Auction and commissions charged at guild sponsored community glass art sales. The deadline for applications this year will be **October 9, 2016** due to the change in date for the Annual Juried Exhibition. Applicants must have been a member of the guild for a full year leading up to the deadline and must not have been a scholarship recipient in the prior year. Educational Scholarships awarded in 2016 will be in the form of registration fees for the **Glass Art Society Conference** to be held in **Norfolk, June 2017**. Scholarship applicants must be GAS members to register for the conference. Virginia Glass Guild will be applying for a **Tech Booth at GAS 2017** to display guild and guild membership marketing materials. Scholarship recipients awarded conference registration funds will be required to operate the guild Tech Booth for a few hours during the conference.

Hannah Kirkpatrick



Dear Virginia Glass Guild,

Thank you for the award of an educational scholarship! I took Sarah Blood's "Where the Magic Happens" neon class at Penland School of Crafts in the Summer of 2015. I was self taught in neon and was looking to take an official class to learn about the process more in depth and to have a concentrated time for studio practice. While there, we learned basic bends, had some prompt projects that used each of these bends, and combined neon with mixed media. It was interesting to see what all the students came up with. I also worked on color tests for a large work for Glass Wheel Studios that was to be finished by October 2015.

Glass Wheel Studios, a gallery and artist studio facility, commissioned me to make a neon art work for the exterior of their building. The phrase, "Labor of Love" is scrawled in the artist's handwriting across a 24 foot facade in red metal and white paint. A pink neon graph runs through the penmanship like an EKG of an unsteady heartbeat, speaking to the energy, hardships, and frustrations to sustain one's passion. This work sits above the door which artists enter through to their studios. Since this was an exterior large scale work, I decided to have the Labor of Love EKG fabricated by IDF Pen Signs. I was heavily involved in the concept and finished design and worked closely with IDF while the work was in progress.

Penland was a great experience for learning neon and making new connections with other artists. Besides bending our own projects, the class collaborated with the hot shop blowing class and filled some of their works (which is food for thought as a artists who crosses many glass processes). We also went to see a local sign maker's shop, who I bought my own ribbon burner from (the specific torch equipment needed for bending neon tubes). Now I can bend neon where ever I go! We also were able to go take a trip into Asheville to see the galleries.

Currently, I am working to translate atmospheric perspective seen in landscapes of mountains into neon, using the light as material. This Spring, I will curate an exhibition, Writing Lightly, at Work | Release which looks at the use of neon and language.

Mission Statement and Guild History

To support, advocate and advance public awareness of glass as an art form.

The Virginia Glass Guild, formerly known as The Peninsula Glass Guild, was established in 1986 to promote quality glass art in the community and to provide a forum for glass arts. The Virginia Glass Guild is organized for educational, artistic and charitable purposes as a 501(c)(3) non-profit organization. With this name change in 2015, artists, businesses and supporters living and working throughout the Commonwealth of Virginia are welcome to join the Guild and further the goals that were set by the Founding Members. These goals include the sharing of artistic ideas, expanding knowledge and awareness of glass as an art form, and stretching artistic imagination through exploration of glass as an artistic medium. Members achieve these goals through an annual public donation of art glass or educational materials related to glass, the purchase and subsequent donation of art, or grants towards those ends, to organizations or individuals consistent with the goals of the Guild. To promote awareness of glass as an art form, the Guild has sponsored the Annual Juried Exhibition at Charles H Taylor Arts Center in Hampton for the past 28 years, in addition to smaller exhibits in venues throughout Virginia.
