Kathy Little Brief Bio

Over the next fifteen years she fine-tuned her craft through courses at The Corning Museum of Glass and The Penland School of Crafts. Eventually she was able to fully devote herself to her glass. She became a board member of the Suffolk Cultural Arts Center, Kathleen is also a staff instructor for the Chrysler Museum of Art Glass Studio.

Artist's Statement

Did woman materialize from rib of man as scripture reads? Today's woman is an evolutionary wonder. Adapting to situations & experiences, social status & hierarchy, poverty & wealth, sickness & in health. The climb of woman in every aspect of life is without limit. Focusing on body image, my fascination with the human body and it's functions, the way the body can accommodate or transform to different life styles or natural creation. The changing girth of a woman's body from childhood to childbearing then changing to expanded gravity from aging.



The Juror: Paul Marioni

One of the founding members of the American Studio Glass Movement, Marioni is based in Seattle and creates sculptures and vessels that incorporate

humor, images of taboo sexuality, genre figures, tribal masks, photographs, and visual puns. He works with blown glass, which might be painted with enamels, and cast glass, which he combines with other mediums, such as photography. He has completed more than 85 public commissions, including cast glass walls, ceilings, and skylights.

Juror's Statement

First, I look at all the work to see which pieces "spoke" to me. Second, I looked at pieces I thought were extremely well done whether they were to my "taste "or not, and third I looked at work that was well presented.

The Guild

This marks the 26th year for the Peninsula Glass Guild and its landmark 25th annual member show. The Guild was established in 1986 to promote quality art glass in the community and to provide a forum for glass artists to gather together for educational and support purposes. Stained glass was the dominant medium in the early years. This show shows how far the group has come, now featuring glass art in all it's varied forms. Besides increasing the types and styles of art, the membership has also grown over the years, as have its activities.

PGG offers workshops for members to encourage continual growth. Trips to see glass and related arts, meetings featuring guest lecturers, and the Annual Glass Show are but a few of the membership benefits.

Three 25th Anniversary scholarships were awarded to individuals this year to help them further their studies in glass. Congratulations to Joshua DeWall, Emilio Santini, and Liesl Schubel!

Each year, the Guild creates a large piece of glass and donates it to a public organization. This piece is funded by the Guild and donations, group designed, constructed, and installed by the Guild. Pieces are displayed at the Newport News SPCA, the Virginia Living Museum, the Charles H. Taylor Arts Center, the Yorktown Victory Center, the Virginia Air and Space Center in Hampton, Shelton on the Bay in Phoebus, the Newport News Main Street Library, the Virginia Holocaust Museum in Richmond, and the Norfolk Botanical Gardens. The Guild copurchased a significant piece of glass for the Chrysler Museum in 1998.
